# **Enrollment in Catholic Higher Education in the United States:** 1980 to 2000

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#### **Major Findings:**

Data gathered for this report allowed me to reach six major findings:

- 1. There were 260 Catholic institutions of higher education in the United States in the fall of 2000, enrolling almost one in five students across all private degree-granting institutions and one in every twenty-two students enrolled in all degree-granting institutions.
- 2. Growth in enrollment in Catholic higher education from 1980 to 2000 was somewhat higher than that of all institutions in the United States, but it was well below that of the *private* sector overall. Enrollment in all degree-granting institutions and in Catholic higher education grew by about twelve percent in the nineties and by twenty-one percent during the two decades, while the combined total for all other private institutions rose by twenty-two percent from 1990 to 2000 and by thirty-seven percent from 1980 to 2000.
- 3. Fewer students enrolled full-time at Catholic 4-year institutions in the fall of 2000 than in the rest of the private sector, sixty-six percent in Catholic institutions versus seventy-five percent in other private institutions. This gap changed very little since 1980.
- 4. Seven of every ten students in Catholic colleges and universities in 2000 were undergraduates, 71 percent at Catholic institutions versus 74 percent at other private institutions. Over the past two decades, the enrollment shift to graduate and first-professional enrollment was almost four percentage points (3.8) greater at Catholic institutions than at other private institutions.
- 5. Women students were attracted to Catholic colleges and universities in unusually high numbers. In 1980, fifty-four percent of those enrolled in Catholic 4-year institutions were women. By 2000, the share climbed to sixty-two percent. Corresponding shares of women students in all other private 4-year institutions were forty-six percent in 1980 and fifty-four percent in 2000.
- 6. The racial/ethnic and citizenship diversity of Catholic institutions grew significantly during the past two decades, but not as much as that of other private colleges and universities. Minorities and non-resident alien students constituted 16.5 percent of Catholic college and university enrollment in 1980 and 26.0 percent by 2000. However, in all other private institutions the share in these groups rose from 17.4 percent in 1980 to 30.7 percent in 2000. The relative growth of Hispanic students in other private institutions was especially noteworthy.

This report was based on data found in the *2002 Digest of Education Statistics* published by National Center for Education Statistics (NCES) and from the IPEDS Peer Analysis System.<sup>2</sup> IPEDS (Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System) data are based on reports filed annually by individual colleges and universities. The remainder of this report provides details to support these findings.

### How Catholic colleges and universities were identified:

Some IPEDS surveys include the question: "What is your institutional control or affiliation?" Four answers are possible: 1= Public, 2= Private, for-profit, 3 = Private, not-for-profit independent (no religious affiliation), and 4 = Private, not-for-profit religious affiliation. If a response of "4" is given, the survey asks that the religious affiliation be specified. Table 180 of the **2002 Digest** indicated that in 2000, 239 institutions identified themselves as "Roman Catholic." A list of these institutions was obtained.<sup>3</sup> From a

review of a similar list several years ago, I knew that not all Catholic institutions classify themselves as "4." Therefore, I checked the list against the current membership of the Association of Catholic Colleges and Universities. Based on this review and information I received about two other colleges, I added 21 additional institutions to the list giving me a total of 260 Catholic colleges and universities Appendix A contains a list of the institutions, along with their Carnegie classifications. This is not a definitive list, but it was the one used for this report. I welcome information that will allow me to revise the list for subsequent reports. In the table below, I compare the distribution of these institutions by Carnegie classifications to that of Other Private not-for-profit institutions in 2000. I also included the distribution of enrollment at Catholic institutions in the fall of 2000 by Carnegie type.

#### **Enrollment Growth:**

Table 2 below includes the fall term enrollment of 1980, 1990 and 2000 in all 4-year institutions of higher education in the U.S., in the 237 Catholic 4-year institutions, in all 260 Catholic institutions, and in all other 4-year private institutions<sup>5</sup>. These data show that the overall enrollment in Catholic colleges and universities grew at a somewhat faster rate during the two decades than did all 4-year institutions, but significantly more slowly than did other private 4-year institutions.

### **Enrollment by Full- and Part-time Attendance Status:**

Data in Table 3 below reveals only modest changes over time in the distribution of enrollment by attendance status. While full-time enrollment in Catholic 4-year colleges and universities grew during the past decade, these institutions continued to rely more heavily on, or provide more opportunities for, part-time students than was true of either all 4-year institutions or of other private 4-year institutions.

### **Enrollment by Degree Level:**

Table 4 at the top of the following page shows that the distribution of enrollment by degree level changed very little over the two decades for all degree-granting institutions in the United States, but for private institutions there was a shift to the graduate and first-professional levels. This change was somewhat more pronounced at Catholic institutions than at other private institutions.

### **Enrollment by Sex of the Students:**

Data in Table 5 on the following page shows that the enrollment of women grew at a much more rapid rate than did that of men in all sectors reviewed. However, Catholic 4-year institutions continued to be more attractive to women students than in either of the comparison groups. In 1980, women constituted 54.4 percent of the enrollment in Catholic 4-year institutions. By 2000, the share had climbed to 62.3 percent. Corresponding figures for other Private 4-year institutions were 46.3 and 53.8 percent. However, the growth in the enrollment of women at other Private 4-year institutions was even more rapid over the two decades than at similar Catholic institutions, 60.1 percent at other Private 4-year institutions compared with 46.0 percent at Catholic institutions. (N.B. Whether comparisons in these tables were between all institutions or 4-year institutions depended on the data available in the **2002 Digest of Education Statistics**.)

### **Enrollment by Race/Ethnicity and Citizenship:**

Table 6A compares the distribution of students by race/ethnicity and citizenship in the fall of 2000 in U.S. higher education and groups of Catholic colleges and universities. As I noted in a 1991 report concerning enrollment in the fall of 1988, Catholic institutions were less diverse than were other groups of colleges and universities. <sup>10</sup>

Table 6B below includes statistics on the growth in enrollment by race/ethnicity and citizenship of students in the same groups of institutions found in Table 6A. Minority enrollment in Catholic Baccalaureate colleges grew more rapidly than it did in other Catholic institutions and in higher education overall in the U.S., but somewhat less so than it did in other private institutions. The growth of Black, non-Hispanic students in Catholic Doctoral/Research universities was notably below that of the other groups of institutions.

Hispanic and Asian or Pacific Islander student enrollment grew especially quickly in Other Private institutions. In 1980, Hispanic student enrollment in all 260 Catholic institutions represented 48.2 percent of that in all Private institutions, but by 2000 the share had dropped to 24 percent. See Table 7A below:

While data in these tables are correct, those for Hispanic students need a fuller explanation. Table 201 in the 2002 Digest of Education Statistics confirmed that institutions from Puerto Rico were included in the Digest. The one Catholic institution in Puerto Rico, Pontifical Catholic University of Puerto Rico - Ponce, accounted for 40.4 percent of all Hispanic students enrolled in the 260 Catholic institutions in 1980. However, due to a decline in the Pontifical University's enrollment and an increase of Hispanic students in other Catholic institutions since then, the University's share of Hispanic students in all Catholic institutions declined to 13.3 percent by 2000. However, this is still a significant share for a single institution. Table 7B below compares enrollment data in all private and all Catholic institutions with and without the Pontifical Catholic University of Puerto Rico. It also compares Hispanic enrollment in 260 Catholic institutions as a share of Hispanic enrollment in all private universities, both with and without the Pontifical University.

Data in Table 7B confirmed that Hispanic enrollment increased significantly in Catholic institutions during the two decades, and that it increased even faster in all private institutions.

It was no surprise that Catholic colleges and universities were less diverse than other groups of higher education institutions. No one knows for sure what portion of students in Catholic colleges and universities are Roman Catholic, but fewer Catholics are either Black or Asian than is true for the country as a whole. The annual national Freshman Survey conducted by UCLA's Higher Education Research Institute (HERI) asks students about their religious preference. HERI reports combine data for Catholic universities with those of other private universities, but they list separate figures for Catholic 4-year colleges. Sixty percent of the freshmen at these institutions said they were Roman Catholic. The most recent estimate of the racial and ethnic composition of all Catholics in the United States was contained in a report of the Center for Applied Research in the Apostolate (CARA). The CARA Catholic Poll 2000 found that three percent of U.S. Catholics were Black and only two percent were Asian. While the CARA distribution did not include Nonresident Aliens, their data suggest at least a partial explanation of why Catholic colleges and universities were less racially and ethnically diverse than were other groups of institutions.

### **Summary:**

The major findings of this report were provided on page one. However, they can be summarized as follows: enrollment in Catholic colleges and universities from 1980 to 2000 closely tracked the overall growth of higher education in the United States, but it lagged behind the rest of the private sector. Catholic institutions continued to enroll a higher proportion of part-time and women students throughout the two decades than did either of the other groups of institutions, while the sector's enrollment shifted somewhat faster to graduate and first-professional levels than did that of the other two groups. Finally, student bodies at Catholic institutions were more diverse at the end of the two decades than at the beginning, but they were less so than the other two groups.
